














Washington State TB Services & Standards Manual

This manual describes policies, protocols and recommendations for the prevention and treatment of tuberculosis (TB) in Washington State. It was written primarily for the Local Health Jurisdictions (LHJs) and Tribal Public Health Partners of Washington State as a reference guide on TB diagnosis, treatment and prevention.





About the Washington State Tuberculosis Program Manual

Purpose

In Washington State, tuberculosis (TB) care and prevention is governed by state law and rule. The purpose of the TB Services and Standards manual is to provide information and guidance to aid local health jurisdictions (LHJs) in fulfilling the requirements detailed in the Revised Code of Washington (RCW) 70.28.005 and the Washington Administrative Code (WAC) 246-170. This manual includes information and links to CDC guidelines and TB Centers of Excellence materials with key steps and information needed to fulfill these required TB care and prevention tasks.

Audience

The most likely readers of this manual are people working in the health field. This may include, but is not limited to: nurses, physicians, Health Officers, Regional Medical Officers, epidemiologists, disease intervention specialists and outreach workers from local and state TB programs, Indian Health Services, clinics and hospitals.

Eliminating Stigmatizing Language

Judgmental terms and negative connotations of words such as 'defaulter' and 'suspect' may be perceived to place blame for the disease and responsibility for adverse treatment outcomes on the patient. To assist in implementing a change in the use of stigmatizing language the Heartland TB Center of Excellence, the International Union Against TB and Lung Disease, the National Society of TB Clinicians, the global TB community and the Treatment Action Group developed this reference tool to aid in identifying suggested replacement language as a reminder of how our words may affect others.



Tuberculosis (TB)

About Tuberculosis



According to the World Health Organization:

- About 1/4 of the world's population are infected with tuberculosis (TB) bacteria, Of those infected, 5-15% will become sick with TB disease. People with weakened immune systems are at even higher risk of becoming sick.
- In 2018, over 1.5 million people died worldwide from TB disease.
- TB is one of the top 10 causes of death worldwide and a leading killer of people who are HIV-positive.

Health Advisory - Consider pulmonary TB disease in patients presenting with symptoms and risk factors consistent with TB, regardless of COVID-19 test results.






- Consultations for clinicians working with patients who have TB infection or TB disease.
 - Participants receive case notes, prepared by the TB ECHO panel, following the session.
- Didactics on TB-related topics offered twice a month.
 - o Continuing education credits available for didactics.
- Mentoring, from TB specialist, on best practice standards in TB care.
- · Ability to participate remotely using free, easy-to-use videoconference technology.
